ADJECTIVES

Adjectives sind *Eigenschaftswörter*. Sie beschreiben eine <u>Person</u>, ein <u>Ding</u> oder ein <u>Tier</u> genauer.

- <u>Paula</u> is beautiful.
- <u>My computer</u> is new.
- <u>Dogs</u> are clever.
Paula is <u>a</u> beautiful <u>girl</u>.
I have <u>a</u> new <u>computer</u>.
Dogs are clever <u>animals</u>.

ADVERBS OF MANNER

Adverbs of Manner sind *Umstandswörter der Art und Weise*. Sie beschreiben eine <u>Handlung</u> genauer, geben also an, wie etwas getan wird.

Alicia sings beautifully. (She sings in a beautiful way/manner.)
The wind blows strongly. (It blows in a strong way/manner.)

ADVERBS OF DEGREE

Adverbs of Degree beschreiben (im Gegensatz zu Adverbs of Manner) keine Handlungen, sondern ein anderes Adjektiv oder Adverb. Sie werden zur Verstärkung oder Abschwächung verwendet und geben somit an, inwieweit eine Aussage zutrifft.

Verstärkung:

Linda is *absolutely* wonderful.
We ran *really* quickly.
(How wonderful is she? → Absolutely wonderful.)
(How quickly did we run? → Really quickly.)

Abschwächung:

- The book is *hardly* interesting. (*How* interesting is it? \rightarrow *Hardly* interesting.)
